OPERATION COMPASSION

Operation Compassion Offers Relief to Flood-Ravaged Texas

(Editor's Note: the following is a personal reflection from Tony Clanton, Director of Operations for Operation Compassion, on his recent travels to Leander, TX).

On July 9, I had the profound privilege of traveling to Leander, Texas, as part of Operation Compassion's ongoing mission to bring hope and aid to those affected by disaster. Kelvin Page, President of Operation Compassion, and our team, driven by compassion and determination, sent two truckloads of disaster supplies to the Leander Church of God, which served as the critical staging area for our relief efforts.

Leander, situated downstream from Kerrville— a town that had already garnered much media attention— suffered equally devastating damage from recent flooding. The destruction was widespread, and the need for help was urgent. Our supplies included cleaning essentials, water, tarps, sleeping bags, blessing hygiene boxes, linens, and much more. These resources were essential in helping families begin the long road to recovery.

Working closely with Texas Bishop Rob Bailey, his dedicated team, and the Men and Women of Action, we set up the staging area— a hub of hope amid chaos. From here, we began assembling food boxes for flood survivors and recovery teams alike. It was inspiring to see so many volunteers come together with one purpose: to serve others in their time of greatest need.

The devastation was heartbreaking. It's hard to put into words the terror and destruction the floodwaters left behind. As we moved through the affected area, we had the opportunity to speak with many victims. We listened to their personal stories—stories of fear, loss, and resilience. We prayed with those who needed comfort and offered words of encouragement, knowing that sometimes, a simple prayer can bring peace to a troubled heart.

The need in Leander is immense, and it remains so. Yet, through these moments of hardship, I am reminded of the power of community and faith. It was truly an honor for me and Operation Compassion to be part of this effort—to stand alongside those who are hurting and to bring a glimmer of hope during their darkest hours. As we continue to serve and support disaster-stricken communities, I am grateful for the opportunity to witness the strength and resilience of the people of Leander, Texas. Our work is far from over, but I am confident that together, with faith and compassion, we can help rebuild lives and restore hope.

MWOA Strengthens Partnerships During Latest Disasters

This summer has been an incredibly active season for Men and Women of Action, with teams serving across the globe and right here at home. From disaster relief efforts to church renovations and community outreach, the mission has not slowed down.

Disaster relief has remained a major focus for MWOA. This summer, our hearts have been with communities in Kentucky and Texas affected by devastating tornadoes and floods. MWOA teams and volunteers—alongside our incredible Church of God family—have responded with compassion and skill in areas hit hard by disaster. Volunteers have been on the ground assisting with tornado and flood relief, bringing hope and practical help to families in crisis. From removing trees and debris to providing clean water, shower trailers, laundromat trailers, food and supplies, MWOA and the Church of God family have stood by these communities in their time of need.

MWOA has also been working hard to prepare for future responses. We recently purchased trailers that will be refurbished and used in upcoming disaster relief efforts. Our team has been making important upgrades to ensure these trailers are fully equipped and ready to roll out alongside the rest of our MWOA disaster equipment when the next need arises.

Our work hasn't stopped with disaster response. Over 30 volunteers partnered with Southwest Indian Ministries (S.W.I.M.) in Gallup, New Mexico, completing upgrades at the S.W.I.M. Campground and a local church (Manueliot Church).

Internationally, a team served in New Zealand at Papakaio Community Church, where they completed Phase One of a much-anticipated project—clearing land and preparing for future construction that will impact generations. Meanwhile, MWOA State Coordinators and Project Leaders have been leading the charge all summer long. Their dedication has powered efforts in outreach projects across the United States.

MINISTRY TO ISRAEL

Ministry to Israel Assists on Several Fronts

Since the previous issue of Care Quarterly, MTI has been engaged with government and people groups with critical assistance in the war-torn region:

- Twelve Day War with Iran: Of the 1,000+ ballistic missiles fired at Israel, 550 made it into Israel airspace. Twenty-eight people were killed, 1,400 wounded and approximately 15,000 people were displaced because of the rocket damage to their homes.
- At the end of the war, MTI assisted families in the city of Beersheba who had suffered from a direct attack by a missile. MTI supplied aid and finances for their immediate needs and will continue to help them get back to a normal life.
- From there MTI staff in Israel traveled to Eilat where they provided clothing and help for 60 families who were impacted by the war.
- In Eilat, MTI provided \$18,000 worth of assistance to a school of 400 where almost every child in the school was from a poor family and are new immigrants into the country.

• Finally, knowing of MTI's previous generosity, a special forces reconnaissance unit in the Israeli Defense Force (IDF) requested if MTI could supply newer, lighter helmets as well as boots designed for desert warfare. Many of these warriors go as much as thirty days in battle zones where their helmets and shoes must be worn at all times. MTI Director Michael Utterback said, "Of course, we agreed and presented these items to them in mid-July."

Tennessee Governor Signs Legislation Benefitting Real Life Village

In April, the Tennessee General Assembly and Governor Bill Lee passed legislation authorizing Real Life Village (RLV) to operate as a campus-style residential pilot program that will house up to 32 residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The legislation provides relief from stringent policies and authorizes the establishment of small residential homes—each housing a minimum of four and up to eight individuals—on a 26-acre integrated community site. The program is designed to offer more independent and supportive living options for disabled adults in a setting that fosters community and care. The pilot will become permanent on January 1, 2032.

In other news, RLV is delighted to announce they are gaining movement toward the launch of the "Real Life Day," program. Next steps include creating the infrastructure on the future campus in Cleveland, Tennessee to start site preparation for their first building, the Community Center.

"We are grateful that Westmore Church of God has licensed the use of space at their Student Center, so that the Day Program can start sooner than originally anticipated," stated RLV Director Mitchell Maloney. "We are currently moving our offices to this new space and over the next few months we will be preparing it and undergoing state licensure for day one of services."

Finally, planning is under way for Real Life Village's second annual Vision Banquet. The event is scheduled for Thursday, November 13, 2025, 6:00 pm at Westmore Church of God. Special musical guest will be Jason Crabb. Mark Richt, former head coach of the University of Georgia, will be the keynote speaker. Last year's Inaugural Vision Banquet was an overwhelming success. RLV is grateful to all donors and supporters for sharing with Real Life Village.

SMCH Launches Worship and Arts Academy

At the SMCH Christmas Banquet, Dr. Dusty Wilson, Director of Global Worship Initiative (GWI), presented a generous donation of musical instruments to Dr. Walt and Tammie Mauldin. The gift, provided by a ministry arm of GWI called Instruments of Grace, included:

- Five electronic keyboards
- Three acoustic guitars
- One complete drum set

The instruments became the foundation of the newly launched Worship and Arts Academy at SMCH. In addition, the academy received a \$10,000 donation to help cover the cost of music lessons for residents.

The Worship Arts Academy will be coordinated by Patty Higgenbottom and will include instructors Dr. Pat Corn on guitar, Sean Evans on drums, Sandy Williams instructing dance, and Patty Higgenbottom who will teach four students at a time in the piano lab. Current enrollment is 40 students who have embraced the opportunity with great enthusiasm. The Academy is fast becoming a vibrant part of the SMCH community.

A significant donation valued at \$35,000 was recently received from Ron Dopf of Cleveland, Tennessee, a longtime friend of the Mauldins. The gift was given in memory of his late wife, Diane Kay, who passed away on January 28, 2025. Her wish was for the Smoky Mountain Children's Home to receive her cherished materials and supplies.

The donation includes:

- Seven state-of-the-art sewing machines
- One embroidery machine
- Multiple looms of fabric and hundreds of spools of thread
- Numerous sewing accessories and tools

These resources are already making an impact. Barbara Miller, of Wooster, Ohio, will use many of the items to continue her meaningful work of making pillowcases and birthday cards for every student. Additional materials will support the SpiritCare Center, helping provide festive and beautiful decorations for upcoming holidays.

Finally, Dr. Walt and Tammie Mauldin traveled to various camp meetings this summer, sharing the mission and work of Smoky Mountain Children's Home across Ohio, Illinois, Kentucky, Virginia, and Tennessee. Notably, at the invitation of Dr. Tim Hill, the Tennessee camp meeting took up a special offering to complete the \$200,000 goal needed to renovate the Tennessee Cottage.

Guillermo recently traveled to El Salvador, where he gave lectures at the National Library to a prestigious group from the Official International College of Doctors, Academics, doctors, businessmen, judges, etc. from various parts of the world. He was at the Church of God in El Salvador, preaching and giving lectures on pastoral care to the pastors.

Looking ahead, in September, we will be in Cleveland, TN, for a few days to meet with our leaders and participate in the Care Ministries Board meeting.

In October, we will travel to Newburgh, NY, for the Global Missionary Summit, and to San Antonio, Texas, where we will participate in a pastoral retreat.
